



## POST-GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Lenox Hill Neighborhood House's Legal Advocacy & Organizing Department is seeking to sponsor law students graduating in 2011, judicial law clerks completing their clerkships in 2011, and, where appropriate, recent law graduates, for fellowships in public interest law such as the Skadden Fellowship, the Equal Justice Works Fellowship and the Kirkland & Ellis Fellowship. The Fellowship will commence in the fall of 2011.

Lenox Hill Neighborhood House serves 20,000 people in need each year and operates out of five East Side sites. Founded in 1894 as a free kindergarten for the children of indigent immigrants, we serve people who "live, work or go to school" from 59<sup>th</sup> Street to 143rd Street, between the East River and Central Park, and on Roosevelt Island. The four attorneys and four legal advocates in our Legal Department provide free, comprehensive civil legal services to thousands of low-income individuals and families on the East Side of Manhattan - reaching those in our community who lack the means to secure their civil legal rights. Our clients include low-income individuals and families; immigrants; older adults; homebound and disabled persons; and homeless and formerly homeless men and women. We operate through a multidisciplinary holistic approach to legal representation, such that our clients receive assistance not only with their civil legal needs, but they also have access to social workers, psychiatrists, case managers, ESOL classes, and more, within the same organization. This synergy of legal advocacy and social services creates a powerful tool to achieve social and legal justice for those in need.
